NCCOR Goals

To accomplish its mission, NCCOR's projects and activities align with one or more of its five goal areas.



1

Identify, design, and evaluate practical and sustainable interventions, especially in high-risk populations and communities.



2

Increase and improve national, state, and local surveillance of childhood obesity.



3

Improve the ability of childhood obesity researchers and program evaluators to conduct research and program evaluation.



4

Provide national leadership to accelerate implementation of evidence-informed practice and policy.



5

Work with non-health partners to integrate childhood obesity priorities with synergistic initiatives (e.g., environmental design and sustainability, food systems, food marketing, disabilities, or economics).



Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program-Education (SNAP-Ed)

- NCCOR helped USDA develop guidance to SNAP agencies and states following a major shift in the national approach and delivery of SNAP-Ed.
 - The toolkit is a collection of evidence-based, actionable tools consistent with the context and policies of SNAP and incorporating evidence-based obesity strategies.
- USDA continues to work with NCCOR to refine the toolkit to ensure it provides a current list of strategies, interventions, and resources.

Why Get Research Used Workgroup?

- The NCCOR External Scientific Panel (NESP) drafted a recommendation related to research translation and dissemination.
 - Most research does not get used.
 - Most researchers need to increase their capacity and skills to ensure their work reaches and resonates with key audiences.
- The workgroup works with members of the CDC-supported Nutrition and Obesity Policy Research and Evaluation Network (NOPREN) Policy Research Impact Working Group.

Childhood Obesity Declines

- **Purpose:** To explore potential drivers of reported declines in childhood obesity, particularly those that influenced disparities
- **Sites:** Anchorage, AK; Granville County, NC; New York, NY; Philadelphia, PA
 - **Inventory of strategies:** Schools, early child education, health care, community
 - **Site visit protocols:** Policy/program developer (how, why); policy/program implementer (how, where, facilitators/barriers [f/b]); community member (f/b, stakeholder involvement); evaluator (evidence)



Fogarty International Center Efforts

- Held fall 2014 meeting on how to engage stakeholders around translational research and build researchers' capacity in Latin America (LA) around childhood obesity
- Next steps:
 - Stakeholders expressed interest in mapping LA efforts that may be applicable to evaluation
 - Four peer-reviewed papers being planned
 1. Contextual issues of childhood obesity in LA, such as urbanization
 2. Connecting research to policy
 3. Capacity building: Training community and health care workers to participate in research
 4. Research priorities
